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A year of growth.

In 2022, the Nashville Adult Literay Council (NALC) celebrated 40 years of transforming lives through literacy. After decades of service, the pulse of NALC is beating as strong as ever. As the fiscal year ends, we at NALC are taking some time to reflect on all our learners, volunteers, and staff have accomplished this year.

In FY23 we:

- served 419 learners
- saw 50% of learners achieve at least one goal
- trained more than 125 new volunteer tutors
- were awarded more than 20 grants
- hired a new Learner & Volunteer Coordinator
- collaborated with our board to create a new three-year strategic plan
- celebrated our 40th birthday at the first Learner & Tutor Banquet since 2019
- and helped shed a light on the pervasive issue of literacy in our city through events like the <u>Literacy Matters Virtual</u> <u>Breakfast</u>

We could not have done any of this work without supporters like you. In FY23, we've received \$227,000 in donations from individual supporters and more than \$550,000 from foundations and corporate partners.

Since 2020, all of our English classes and a majority of our one-on-one tutoring has been held virtually. While we've started to reintroduce some in-person opportunities, online learning has been a major success. Pre-pandemic barriers, like finding childcare and fighting traffic, were removed with online options. Students are receiving more instructional hours and achieving goals at a higher rate than ever before.


With these successes came a new challenge. Our waitlist climbed to more than 300 potential learners. Through an innovative pilot program started this spring, we hope to serve learners waiting for classes in a quick and efficient manner.





Learners in English Classes

ELL Match Award: Monique Killyon, Snahider Vega, and Janiree Noriega

Volunteer tutor, Monique Killyon, has been working with Snahider Vega and Janiree Noriega, a couple who are learning English as an additional language. Together, Snahider, Janiree and Monique have completed more than 80 hours of tutoring, the most of any other match this year! They have completed seven Burlington English modules, read books together, and celebrated wins big and small, like leasing a new apartment and going to a Backstreet Boys concert.

Snahider and Janiree are originally from Venezuela. They appreciate NALC's organization, willingness to help students, and methodologies. Monique appreciates that NALC provides an opportunity to do meaningful and rewarding work, and told us that tutoring gives her an opportunity to connect with and support different people whom she likely would not have encountered outside of this environment.

Adult Basic Education Match: Andrew Giacobone and John Faust

Andrew and John have been working together for six months and have built an effective and inspiring learning partnership.

Andrew is incredibly thoughtful and creative about incorporating different types of activities into tutoring sessions, and he is never afraid to try something new. When asked what advice he would give to prospective tutors Andrew said: "Be patient and encouraging. Don't be afraid to mix up the book lessons with games and pop quizzes, to stave off ennui. Let your enthusiasm be contagious!"

Since enrolling in our program, John has made tremendous progress on several of his goals. His reading, comprehension and fluency have improved. He has completed an EKG certification class for his job, and he has recently begun applying to local nursing programs. When asked what his tutor has done that helps him the most, John said that he really appreciates his tutor's "willingness to learn... in order to help me... I love that he is very patient with me."

and called multiple nonprofits until he found us. We made a list of things to do, and he's been committed to helping us improve our data management, which increases our efficiency and helps

us better tell our story to funders. The work Jarrod is doing today will help us grow in the future, and this is why we named him our Volunteer of the Year.


The Yellow Glasses Project


Partnership with FiftyForward
